Politics I supposed to be the second-oldest profession. I have come to realize that it bears a very close resemblance to the first. **–Ronald Reagan**

**Comments:** With politicians over-influenced by lobbyists, then screwing the American tax payer, this statement is often true.

### **119. POLITICS & TRICKS**

I reject the cynical view that politics is a dirty business. –**Richard M. Nixon**

### **120. POLITICS & VICTORY**

Finishing second in the Olympics gets you silver.  
Finishing second in politics gets you oblivion. –**Richard M. Nixon**

### **121. POLITICS & VICTORY**

I don't know anything that builds the will to win better than competitive sports. –**Richard M. Nixon**

**Comments:** Can you say conscientious professional, but also 'work-a-holic'?

### **122. POLITICS IN D.C.**

Washington is a city of Southern efficiency and Northern charm. –**John F. Kennedy**

**Comments:** I.e., slow and rude. The answer—as is usually the case—is proper balance... The efficiency of New Yorkers and the courtesy of Texans.

### **123. POVERTY & BLUE COLLAR WORKERS**

The progress of society is mainly  
the improvement in the condition of the workingmen of the world. –**Rutherford B. Hayes**

**Comments:** That's because the wealthy already have it 'good.' Making their lives significantly better—especially when others are struggling, if not suffering—is an abuse of the balanced function of government (which is to favor neither poor nor rich).

### **124. POVERTY & EDUCATION**

Poverty must not be a bar to learning  
and learning must offer an escape from poverty. –**Lyndon B. Johnson**

### **125. POVERTY & MINORITIES**

There can be no permanent disfranchised peasantry in the United States. –**James A. Garfield**

### **126. PREEMPTIVE STRIKES**

When you see a rattlesnake poised to strike,  
you do not wait until he has struck to crush him. –**Franklin D. Roosevelt**

### **127. PRESIDENTS & CHARACTER**

I will soon cease to be a servant and will become a sovereign. –**James K. Polk**

### **140. PRESIDENTS & SPEECH**

You can't know too much, but you can say too much. –**Calvin Coolidge**

than to open one's mouth and remove all doubt. –**Abraham Lincoln**

In the television age, the key distinction is between the candidate who can speak poetry

**Comments:** Several presidents have echoed this sentiment. Kunhardt, Jr. [Riverhead Books: New York), 1999], give the voter a brief understanding of just what personality types the White House has witnessed.

“Because the content of the presidency is uncertain, the person of the president takes on added importance. The manner in which the individual brings his (someday her) mind and energies to bear on the events that frame his time is crucial to the way the office is conceived and executed in that time. The incumbent's own experience enthusiasms, ideas, interests, prejudices, working style, and temperament will markedly affect what happens in the office and what comes out of it.” (xiv)

### 1. **George Washington** (Federalist)

“Washington's life is inextricably linked to the Revolution, but over time it has been largely forgotten that his true heroism sprang less from his accomplishments as a military man than from qualities deep inside him: **his character and his vision**. ‘My politics are plain and simple,’ he wrote. ‘I think every nation has a right to establish... [a] government under which it conceives it shall live most happy.’” (p. 6)

### 2. **John Adams** (Federalist)

“John Adams was in many ways the **deepest thinker** of his generation, an idealist whose calling card was his extraordinary independence. ...Though his parents hoped he would enter the ordained ministry, the idea soon came to rankle young Adams. ‘I had some faculty for public speaking,’ he later wrote, ‘and determined that I should make a better lawyer than divine.’” (p. 132)

### 3. **Thomas Jefferson** (Democratic-Republican)

“From his mountaintop estate of Monticello, Thomas Jefferson loomed over his age as its most brilliant and influential figure. **Omnivorously curious**, he was proficient in a dozen subjects, from agriculture, science, history, and languages to religion, political philosophy, architecture and music.” (p. 262)

### 4. **James Madison** (Democratic-Republican)

“He was the towering intellect of the founding fathers, but from James Madison's earliest days he was prone to sickness and exhaustion. ...Madison's four years in Philadelphia not only revealed him as America's most **gifted administrator**, they also convinced him that America's government was deeply flawed.” (p. 401)

### 5. **James Monroe** (Democratic-Republican)

“Throughout our history there have been presidents who possessed an almost religious belief in the principles of the United States and who sought ways to extend America's influence on the world stage. That was certainly the case for our fifth president, a passionate visionary and lifelong diplomat...” (p. 306)

### 6. **John Quincy Adams** (Democratic-Republican)

“A recluse by nature, always more respected than loved, he described himself as a ‘cold’ and ‘silent animal.’ ‘I well know that I shall never be a popular man,’ he wrote. ‘I have none of the honey which is the true flycatcher.’” (p. 168)

**7. Andrew Jackson** (Democrat)

“Like all presidents who have won important power struggles, Andrew Jackson was a fighter. He was in fact the most violent-tempered man ever to rise to the presidency. ...Others recognized different dimensions to the old warrior: his tenacious intelligence, **his belief in the common man**, and what one surprised observer called his ‘mysterious charm wrought upon old and young.’” (p. 350)

**8. Martin Van Buren** (Democrat)

“Friendly and sociable, always impeccably dressed, the savvy, red-haired Dutchman also had a certain coldness. When his wife of eleven years died of tuberculosis in 1819, all he said was that he felt an ‘anxiety.’ And he could be ruthless in his political dealings, switching positions on key issues to further his career.” (p. 91)

**9. William Henry Harrison** (Whig)

“William Henry Harrison enjoyed playing the role of humble, backwoods hero.” (p. 18)

**10. John Tyler** (Whig)

“Tall and gaunt to the point of emaciation, with a prominent Roman nose that he joked about, he had a courtly bearing and a silvery voice, which he frequently utilized for **impassioned oratory**.” (p. 211)

**11. James Knox Polk** (Democrat)

“James Knox Polk, the grandson of a blacksmith, grew up in rural Tennessee, where his father was a successful farmer and landowner. Thin and sickly as a boy, he was allowed to pursue an education instead of farming... Dignified and courteous, though opinionated and secretive...” (p. 409)

**12. Zachary Taylor** (Whig)

“In 1849 there rose to the nation’s highest office a sixty-four-year-old fighting man who was so politically inexperienced he had never even voted. As had been true for John Adams, his presidency offers a cautionary tale about bringing too much independence into the White House, for Zachary Taylor’s crusty independence and complete disdain for the maneuvering of politicians would eventually put him in conflict with almost everyone in government.” (p. 140)

**13. Millard Fillmore** (Whig)

“...the vice president waiting in the wings was as unlike John Tyler as a person could be. He was a self-made New Yorker known for his thoroughgoing commitment to the Union and to the Whig party. ...All his life Millard Fillmore had **driven himself to succeed**. Raised in dire poverty in western New York State, in the most desperate beginnings of any of our presidents...” (p. 218)

**14. Franklin Pierce** (Democrat)

“A heavy social drinker always ready for a rowdy night on the town, he soon became one of the most popular men in Washington. ...Fighting liquor, sadness, ill health and religious doubt, in 1840 Pierce finally renounced alcohol.” (p. 53)

**15. James Buchanan** (Democrat)

“His elegant home came to symbolize a man for whom appearances were all-important. Ever since his college days, when he was expelled for drunkenness and insolence, he determined that his public reputation would from then on be impeccable. From the same generation as Martin van Buren, Buchanan was learned and ambitious and possessed an extraordinary memory.” (p. 97)

**16. Abraham Lincoln** (Republican)

Some people would call him a loser. He ran for state office—was beaten. He started a business—it failed. He ran for congress and lost. He was nominated for vice-president, he lost again. Fortunately, Abraham Lincoln knew what it took to be a winner. Persistence.

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“With a strong distaste for manual labor, he launched out on his own and began attracting attention in Illinois. **He was friendly, he was honest**, and he was a beguiling storyteller.” (p. 105)

**17. Andrew Johnson** (Democratic-Union)

“...a stubborn white supremacist almost entirely lacking in Lincoln’s political skills. ...The son of an illiterate porter and a laundress...” (p. 225)

**18. Ulysses Simpson Grant** (Republican)

“His story contains an important warning: the capacities for presidential leadership do not always reside in military heroism.” (p. 25)

**19. Rutherford Birchard Hayes** (Republican)

“All his life, Hayes was **hardworking, methodical, and impeccably honest**—so pristine, James Garfield once said, ‘no nickname can be pinned on him’ **He saw himself as nothing more than a nonpartisan public servant**, intent on cleansing the taints that had infected his own party during the Grant administration.” (p. 148)

**20. James Abram Garfield** (Republican)

“James Abram Garfield was his own kind of politician. He was **the only preacher ever to become president; all his life he believed that a higher power was leading him onward...**” (p. 59)

**21. Chester Alan Arthur** (Republican)

“If Andrew Johnson represented a nadir for the presidency, at least no one ever charged him with graft or corruption. But with the administration of Ulysses S. Grant, a new era, dominated by spoilsmen, began. And in 1880 the Republicans nominated for vice president a man many considered the epitome of corrupt politics—New York City’s infamous former customs officer, Chester Arthur. Raised as a preacher’s son in northeastern Vermont, Chester Arthur as a young man was **an idealistic lawyer whose chief interest was civil rights.**” (p. 238)

**22. Stephen Grover Cleveland** (Democrat)

“To many he seemed like a new Andrew Jackson: he had the same toughness and incorruptibility, and the same **courage to stand up to any obstacle.**” (p. 360)

**23. Benjamin Harrison** (Republican)

“No politician ever made less use of his family heritage than Benjamin Harrison, grandson of President William Henry Harrison. **All his life he had a desire to be his own man.** ...Harrison was a disciplined, dispassionate, proper individual and one of the finest lawyers in Cincinnati. But the very qualities that made him excel—his methodical approach, his absorption in logic and detail, his unwillingness to delegate—turned him into an overefficient workhorse with little sense of fun.” (p. 174)

**24. Stephen Grover Cleveland** (Democrat)

“Grover Cleveland is the only president to have been elected to two non-consecutive terms.”  
(Greenbrier/Scentex)

**25. William McKinley** (Republican)

“One of the most **self-confident** men ever to rise to the presidency... It was self-confidence that would prove immensely invaluable in what would turn out to be a watershed presidency.” (p. 312)

**26. Theodore Roosevelt** (Republican)

“Theodore Roosevelt saw himself as a twentieth-century gladiator... Infatuated with his own strength and power. ...The secret of Roosevelt’s obsession with power lay in his sickly beginnings and his struggle to live up to the expectations of his demanding father.” (p. 372)

**27. William Howard Taft** (Republican)

“William Howard Taft grew up in a well-to-do Cincinnati family, the son of a highly ambitious mother and a nationally respected father. After excelling at Yale and then at the Cincinnati Law school, he practiced law in his home state and began a swift and easy climb up the republican ladder.” (p. 418)

**28. Thomas Woodrow Wilson** (Democrat)

“Woodrow Wilson presented an austere public personality, and all his life was careful to cover up deep felt passions. ...As a young man he became known as **an intense and hardworking scholar**.” (p. 325)

**29. Warren Gamaliel Harding** (Republican)

“Warren G. Harding was an obliging, **generous-spirited, amiable man** who could not bear to offend anyone. The son of a self-taught veterinarian and doctor who was always in debt, he had grown up insecure.” (p. 68)

**30. John Calvin Coolidge** (Republican)

“John Calvin Coolidge grew up on the family farm in Vermont, working so hard he was left little time for himself. ...Losing his beloved mother at age twelve, he came increasingly under the influence of his taciturn, puritanical father... Calvin, too, saw to it that he wasted nothing. Reading for pleasure, anything musical, dancing, playing a sport, indulging a hobby, having a sweetheart all squandered precious time and energy.” (p. 273)

**31. Herbert Clark Hoover** (Republican)

Herbert Clark Hoover was the son of a small-town Iowa blacksmith and a kindly Quaker mother, whose simple, **humane faith** would become an important influence in his life. ...[After college] One of his most valued qualities was his toughness under inhospitable conditions. ...By his ability to recognize promising mines, Hoover made millions for his company and rose rapidly in its ranks.” (p. 283)

**32. Franklin Delano Roosevelt** (Democrat)

“An only child born to great wealth, Roosevelt grew up revering his aging father. His mother was younger, and over the years she showered her delicate son with adoration. ...When Franklin entered politics after college, he patterned his campaign style after his hero Theodore Roosevelt. It didn’t matter that they belonged to different parties—family ties were far stronger than political ties.” (p. 185)

**33. Harry S. Truman** (Democrat)

“Harry Truman believed in the United States with an intensity that few today can quite understand. He profoundly believed, without ever articulating it, that nothing fundamentally wrong could ever happen to this country, because the United States was God’s country. It was a nineteenth-century belief from a twentieth-century Midwestern optimist.” (p. 249)

**34. Dwight David Eisenhower** (Republican)

“When Eisenhower returned home after the war, the public response to him was overwhelming. He was a hero who seemed to fit his times exactly—a **humble, honest, clean-cut** kind of man the country could feel good about.” (p. 36)

**35. John Fitzgerald Kennedy** (Democrat)

“...all the discussions at our table growing up were about government and political life.’ Joe Kennedy became the architect of his children’s lives. ‘We want winners,’ he told them. ‘We don’t want losers around here.’ Home life was defined by constant verbal testing, competitive athletics, iron discipline, and no sympathy.” (p. 196)

**36. Lyndon Baines Johnson** (Democrat)

[Johnson was] “one of the most ambitious professional politicians in the history of the nation. ...From early on **he developed a deep and genuine compassion for the poor and the oppressed**.”

**37. Richard Milhous Nixon** (Republican)

“...the essence of every great leader I have ever known—and I’m not saying I’m great—he was a lonely man.’ His mother was a well-educated Quaker, whom he called a saint. His father was uneducated, working many jobs, and had a reputation for starting arguments with just about anyone. ...Picked on as a child, Nixon wasn’t comfortable around anyone outside his own family. ...Graduating third in his class at Duke Law School...” (p. 386)

**38. Gerald Rudolph Ford** (Republican)

“**Straightforward, honest, a man of recognized decency**, he traced his personal qualities back to his Midwestern childhood.” (p. 79)

**39. James Earl Carter, Jr.** (Democrat)

Of all the presidents who came after Hayes, the man who most resembled his style was **a Southern governor who hated politics-as-usual**. ...James Earl Carter, Jr., was born into a peanut-farming family in 1924. From his father, he acquired a lifelong belief in discipline and hard work. From his mother, he inherited **a compassion for the poor and a commitment to civil rights**.” (p. 157)

**40. Ronald Wilson Reagan** (Republican)

“He had a difficult childhood. His father was an itinerant show salesman and an alcoholic. And in school his undiagnosed nearsightedness held him back until a writing teacher named B.J. Frazier brought out Reagan’s native talent. ‘I was always called on to read [my papers],’ Reagan remembered.” (p. 292)

**COMMENTS:** He used to be a Democrat—think all ‘flip flopping’ is evil?

**41. George Herbert Walker Bush** (Republican)

“George Herbert Walker bush was raised in privilege in suburban Connecticut, in a family that cared deeply about international issues. ...His father, Prescott Bush, was a successful businessman who went on in later life to become

a Senator. Bush credited him with passing on his core values: “**Tell the truth, be honest, work hard, try to see the other guy’s point of view while sticking to your own principles.**” (p. 337)

**42. William Jefferson Clinton** (Democrat)

“William Jefferson Clinton was born in 1946 as William Blythe III, the son of a salesman who died before his son was born and a professional nurse, Virginia dell, who became the single greatest influence in her son’s life. From an early age his interests drew him into politics. ‘**Civil rights was the defining political issue of my childhood,**’ he said, starting when I was quite young, in the 1950s. ..In 1963, he took the last name of his stepfather, Roger Clinton, an alcoholic whose rough behavior brought out in Clinton new powers of resilience and empathy.” (p. 430)

**43. George Walker Bush** (Republican)

**Comments:** Courageous, principled, religious. [This book ends before W. took office].

**44. Barack Hussein Obama** (Democrat)

**Comments:** Ideologue, **humble**, eloquent. [This book ends before Barak took office].

“Obama prided himself on his self-awareness, his ability to stand a step removed from his circumstances and apply a sense of perspective.” The Center Holds: Obama and His Enemies, p. 121, by Jonathan Alter Simon and Schuster: New York City, N.Y.), 2013
